NAWAKWA LODGE ALBRIGHT TRAIL CREW

A group of eight dedicated Arrowmen headed to Finley Albright to build an important bridge on the five mile wilderness loop trail. This bridge covered a small intermittent steam that crossed the trail. Without this bridge, the trail would be subject to severe

erosion and would become a muddy hazard to hikers. These small but important individual projects together with large trail crew projects are needed to accomplish the overall goal of completing the wilderness loop trail.

While this is heading to the printer, the second major work effort of the Camp Finley Albright Wilderness Trail project is underway. On Saturday, August 3rd Nawakwa Lodge in conjunction with Scout Troops, and Venture Crews, is planning to continue a trail that will complete a five mile loop in the wilderness area of Albright Scout

Reservation. A bag lunch is to be provided, along with the never-ending satisfaction of a job well done. Registration for the Trail Crew Work Day is being done



- YOU are entitled to submit articles to this newsletter (it is yours after all). You even have a chance to publish and edit this newsletter as well.
- YOU are entitled to help your chapter decide what your chapter does and assist with or participate in those events.
- YOU are entitled to vote and voice your opinion on such things as dues and other lodge programs.
- YOU are entitled to attend the National Order of the Arrow Conference (NOAC) held every two years (next in 2015).
- YOU are even entitled the high honor of being an elangomat or assisting in any position during an Ordeal weekend.
- YOU are entitled to talk, work, share, learn, and experience with your brothers.
- YOU are entitled to seal your membership in the Order through the attainment of Brotherhood membership.
- YOU are entitled to and obligated to Cheerful Service to others.
